

Years ago, I moved to Willow Tree Stables in Romulus, Michigan, and that is my riding home. I love taking dressage lessons with Amanda Agemak and riding in schooling shows. My 27-year-old Morgan Horse, JCPLionheart (Reno), affectionately nicknamed Mr. Bean, is full of personality. He loves to open his door and free my other two horses, though they can only get to the paddock! He even picks up items I drop, like a hat, and can identify specific objects when asked. While he always makes me laugh now, he wasn't always so easy.

Reno came to me at four and was my most challenging horse. He pushed me to learn more through horsemanship clinics and dressage. Without these, we might not have made it 24 years together, but now we have an incredible bond.

Horses have always been my life, and they're lifelong partners for me. I not only ride but paint them too, so understanding their behavior and anatomy is essential. From Billie Eilish proclaiming "I'm a bad guy—duh!" to Jack Johnson singing, "We're always better when we're together," to X Ambassadors' "Two kids you and me; living like we're renegades," the lyrics spoke to Romney, and Donatello seemed to glow, too.

Romney, who turns 75 in April, and Donatello, her 25-year-old Hanoverian gelding (Del Piero—Armada), who last competed together at the Grand Prix level in 2020, made history as the first to complete their "initiation" ride in the International Arena at the Adequan Global Dressage Festival show grounds in Wellington, Florida. The pair were supported by a cadre of family, including husband U.S. Sen. Mitt Romney (Utah), friends, admirers, spectators and well-wishers.

"It was so thrilling," Romney said. "He (Donatello) felt like he was 5 years old." Donatello, whom she's owned since he was 9, proved he still has the goods as he revved up when it was time for tempi changes in the freestyle. "I couldn't bring him back enough to get them, but that's OK," she said with a laugh. "You know, that's how he was when I showed him. He was very fresh, very forward, very hot."



Team #727: Linda Williams and Willamina

I've loved horses for as long as I can remember. As a child, I read horse books and doodled them constantly. In high school, I free-leased a pony and participated in 4-H shows, though my attempt to train a young filly was less successful. After that, life took over—college, marriage, and family—and my horse dreams were put on hold.

Fast forward 48 years: retired from teaching, I thought I'd spend my time golfing and weaving. But when my granddaughter took riding lessons, I realized it wasn't too late for me either! Forty years later, I'm still taking lessons—though without a horse of my own—but I've had the privilege of riding many talented school horses, each teaching me valuable lessons about riding and life.

I'm not a ribbon chaser, but this is my first real ribbon. I started with horses 30 years ago when my daughter wanted to ride. For the first 15 years, I clapped, smiled, and wrote checks. Then I began riding her old lesson horse, Jimmy, who may have wanted to

retire because I ended up on the ground a lot!

After my daughter went to college, I took on her horse, Caliente. I quickly learned that she didn't like cows—or bikes. To ride her safely, I needed to become a better rider, which led me to dressage. I started dressage lessons with Young Flag, but my first schooling show was terrifying. I completed my first test, and the judge kindly noted my geometry was bad. I wasn't after ribbons—I just wanted to trail ride, but dressage helped.

Riding the Century Club ride was the most fun I've ever had, and it meant more to me than I expected.

Like many, I've always loved horses. I began riding at 12, owned a hunter in high school, and rode daily. But when it was time for college, I had to sell him. After a 35-year career in teaching and higher education, I returned to riding, eventually retiring early to become a working student. I learned so much and enjoyed every moment.

I've loved horses for as long as I can remember and have always had them in my life in one way or another. From Shetland and Welsh ponies as a child to a retired off-the-track Thoroughbred in my 20s, I've had the privilege of riding many wonderful horses over the years.

In 2019, I found myself at a crossroads. After riding at a hunter/jumper barn for seven years, I lost two beloved school horses and started considering a switch to dressage. My first experiences as a young man with horses were all negative, so I did not pursue riding. When I was 50 years old, I reconnected with horses, and the trainers I worked with were dressage riders. To rid myself of fear lingering from the early experiences, I purchased a safe horse, and I began to feel more competent in the saddle.

I started breeding Danish Warmblood mares and crossed them with Arabian stallions. One client, Sue Bender, became excited about this and is keeping the idea alive. In the breeding area, I received excellent guidance from Leif Sorensen in Denmark and from Danish Warmblood judges.

I was also becoming a more accomplished rider. Worth mentioning is Grenadier, my second mount as a Century Club member. I also rode his dam Gunella and his sire Rambo. With help from people who trusted the quality of Oak Hill Ranch horses, several awards were earned to place the Oak Hill breeding program among the top in the country for five years running.

My riding developed to the Prix St. Georges level, and in 2009 I showed the stallion, Rambo, at that level.

For this Century Club ride, completed just before my 86th birthday, I rode Virtu. This ride was my retirement ride, and I hung up my spurs. Because opportunities were limited in New York City where she grew up, Montie constantly read books about horses and was enthralled whenever she could get near a real horse. Riding lessons were treasured occasions.

First Level has been more difficult as our canter still needs improvement. Presently, I am at a performance barn with Kristen Chasnis. Maybe Libby and I will eventually discover the secret to accomplishing a rhythmic, well-balanced canter. If not, our journey together has been fun, and every ride is blessed.

Team #791: Susan Marcovitz and Chesapeake Bay


From: Lake Worth, Florida | Ages: 74 & 26 | Combined Age: 100 | Test: Introductory Level Test A
